The September-October artists' reception at Valley Art will welcome JoAnn M. Wellner, a glass artist whose earliest memories are of flowers in her grandmother's garden. The faces of pansies, the vivid red poppies and towering hollyhocks gave her an appreciation for the beauty and magic in nature. Floral patterns continue to influence her work today.

An occasional abstract piece gives her the freedom to allow a piece of art to "just happen."

Her formal education led to a 39-year career in dental hygiene. During these years, while working part time and raising two boys, she was drawn to the art of stained glass. For over 20 years she made items to sell and received commissions to do work.

Wellner said, "The resurgence of glass fusing that was taking place in the glass world piqued my interest. In 1998 I completed a beginning glass fusing class. Initially my work appeared structured, very much in the style of stained glass. Fortunately ... I had the privilege of seeing the work of Roger Thomas, a well known Portland glass artist. His work demonstrated that one could actually 'paint' with glass and create realistic images, even landscapes."


In 2005 she studied with Miriam DiFiore, Abate Zanetti Scuola, in Murano, Italy, where she took a class in advanced fusing techniques. Oh, such suffering these artists must endure for their art!

She is now retired from her first career and is vigorously pursuing her glass work in her home studio, where she also teaches glass fusing classes.

Lynn Adamo, who has a business in Hillsboro — Our House Design — and does custom mosaic installations, murals and art panels, will show her recent work: handmade felt, along with glass and stone pieces. Tiled work and handmade felt will pose a juxtaposition of shiny and matte elements.

Adamo has traveled to Italy and Turkey to observe firsthand Roman and Byzantine mosaic artists. Inspired by Antoni Gaudi's work in Barcelona, Spain, and the hand-painted and relief tiles of the California potters of the early 1900s, she has adapted the uses of ancient techniques and timeless natural materials to create modern interpretations of a classic art form.

A bachelor of science degree in graphic design from University of California, Davis, in 1980, led to tile and ceramic workshops at Oregon College of Art and Craft

in the late 1990s through 2004. She has been a visiting artist at schools in Hillsboro.

She has a studio at Sequoia Gallery in Hillsboro on Northeast Third Avenue and has completed many public and private projects, including mosaic paving for a water feature in a new Hillsboro public park, in 2008.

Sylvia Tucker was raised in Mississippi, when art lessons were not available in high school or the first years of college. She drew on her own. She married, moved to New Orleans, took a life drawing class and, then, instead of continuing a degree in Spanish and horticulture, she signed up for nothing but art classes. She finished college with a degree in painting and never looked back.

After being admonished that no one makes a living painting, Tucker earned an education degree and taught elementary art in Texas for 15 years. Painting never stopped calling her and she took classes in landscapes and figures, drawing, anatomy, oils and pastels.

In 1991 she decided to stop teaching full time

and got to work painting. She has painted ever since while trying to maintain a "beginner's mind." She has been practicing careful observation and sensitive line work at life drawing groups for over 39 years.

After years living in flat, urban Texas, she and her husband spent 10 years looking for paradise in the Northwest, and perhaps have found it. They live just west of Portland, she can now find mountains or vineyards, forests or the ocean, all within a short drive.

This variety has given her a rich supply of things for seasonal still lifes, which will be featured in the September Valley Art show in oils and pastels.

A reception for these artists will be at Valley Art, First Wednesday, Sept. 2, from 5:30 to 8 p.m., 2022 Main St., Forest Grove.

Show Crew Interview:

We have a dedicated group of people who place and hang the artwork for our featured artist shows and we'd like to have you learn a little more about them.

Merrie French asked each of them some questions and here are Linda Wilke's and E.J. Baeza's answers:

What brought you through the front door of Valley Art and what drew you to take on the challenge of hanging the shows?

Linda — It was in 1998, April or June, that I started as a sitter at Valley Art. I think in about September or October I started hanging the show. I felt I could do the job so I offered to help.

E.J. — Kristen Ling (A Framers Touch owner) suggested I check out VAA when I first arrived here in Forest Grove, to see if (the gallery) would be interested in exhibiting my work.

What shows do you remember as of great interest or great challenge, either here or elsewhere?

Linda — Doing my bfa show at Pacific Lutheran University with all the other students, as we were in so many different meda. It was a challenge to show each one to the best effect and still keep it as a whole show.

E.J. — Well my first hanging job for the 2007 AAE was a great experience for me because I was able to make an immediate contribution and see firsthand how an all-volunteer organization could pull off such a big art event so successfully. What differences between the old gallery show space and the new? What challenges are the same? What do you like better now or miss from the old show space?

Linda — I like the clean look of the gallery; it looks really professional. But I miss having an area that looks designated for the show gallery area. I also miss the island and being able to break the area up. The lighting is better but we still could have a few more lights. Maybe in each of the cubby hole (shelf areas) instead of spots on them.

E.J. — The old gallery space seemed a bit cluttered and did not have the look of an integrated gallery space. The art work was not able to be exhibited to its greatest advantage. The new space has an integrated look; it can accommodate a great amount of varied art pieces and still look clean and uncluttered. The lighting is better and the art work is exhibited in a much better light figuratively and literally.

What in your "before Valley Art" life equipped you to tackle show hanging, either training, exposure or experience? Where and why did it start?

Linda — After high school I became a dental lab technician. I took that training to start making jewelry. I got my two-year art degree in 1989 and then transfered to Pacific Lutheran University. I did work study there and in Green River. I was a teacher assisstant in pottery, weaving, paper making, and did work study as a pottery and gallery assistant. I worked at a pottery studio and helped set things up in the sale gallery too.

E.J. — I worked in the exhibit and display business for 25 years and learned a great deal about exhibit engineering, construction and installation. I have a good working knowledge of interior building and decorative materials and display methods including lighting, color and retail display. I worked in the Southern California division of Exhibitgroup Inc., the nation's largest designer, manufacturer and installer of trade show, museum and special event exhibits, displays and 3-D marketing centers.

What brought you to Forest Grove? What other passions do you have in life that are important to you?

Linda — My husband's work brought us from Puyallup, Wash. Other passions are the Baha'i Faith, my husband, raising my children, needlework, cooking, canning, gardening and helping with other children. I also loved being a Girl Scout for 22 years.

E.J. — My wife, Kathy, and I were looking for a small community that had the potential to become a cultural arts center. We

wanted to be part of the development as both facilitators and artists. Forest Grove seemed to us to be the perfect combination of existing and potential attributes for the creation of a cultural arts center for Washington County on a more intimate scale. I am also a musician and videographer and I am excited about the opportunities in these fields that have presented themselves in Forest Grove and Washington County.

Any favorite shows or laughter you enjoyed as you look back?

Linda — There was an oriental show, a couple of garden shows and the watercolor show, because they were so challenging and turned out so well. I enjoy meeting the all the people and getting to know them.

E.J. — I have had the best time

participating in the events that have surrounded the FG 1st Wednesday and VAA events and activities. I am so happy to have met the wonderful people that make these special events possible and so enjoyable. Kathy and I have never been so involved with and warmly received by a community like Forest Grove. The VAA is a natural extension of the neighborly spirit of involvement, participation and caring.
